Canastota coach Laidlaw a real straight-shooter

Canastota High School coach Marcia Laidlaw keeps on keeping on.

The 65-year-old coaching legend had the undefeated Raiders girls volleyball team atop Class B heading into Friday's showdown against

Class A power Oneida. Canastota defeated Oneida and improved to 15-0.

Laidlaw, who has been coaching at Canastota since 1973 (she took three years off from 2004-07 after retiring from teaching), marched past 750 wins in January and has her team on the verge of one of its most successful seasons.

Her record at Canastota is 758-90, an 89 percent winning percentage, and the most victories by a volleyball coach in Section III.

Recently, she was named New York's volleyball Coach of the Year by the National Federation of High School Coaches Association. She was named the All-Central New York Coach of the Year last March after leading the Raiders through an 18-0 season and to a third straight Section III title.

You retired from teaching (and high school coaching) in 2004. Why'd you return?

"I took three years off. The person they hired, for the most part, it didn't pan out for her with teaching."

Then-superintendent Fred Bragan, and some former players who had daughters in the program, asked her to return. "I was also coaching at Mohawk Valley Community College. I said it all depends on how my season goes at MVCC in the fall. ... It all worked out well, and this is my eighth

Why still coach? Couldn't you be sitting on a beach in Florida somewhere, drinking a pina colada?

"I was born in

Gouverneur. It's cold up there. (laughs) The older I get, I can't stand this cold weather. Yesterday (Wednesday) my practice was at 6 o'clock (p.m.) and I'm sitting in my recliner, and I'm like, 'OK, you've got to get out of the recliner and this warm house. ... It's not the coaching, it's just getting out in this cold weather. So would I love to be sitting on that warm beach? Yeah.'

So why still coach a bunch of teenage girls?

"I love coaching. That's my first love. I guess it's to take a person and watch them progress as they play. That's the joy of it ... that keeps me going back.

"I've truly been blessed at Canastota with some very, very good young ladies. I hope they realize the success I've had is a result of

their hard work and effort." Do you miss teaching? "To be honest with you -

no. ... I taught and coached at the right time, and I retired at the right time.

"Let's put it this way, I have a Wal-Mart trac phone. I'm still on dial-up on my computer. I'm in the dark ages as far as all of that."

Henninger rolls Westhill in battle of area's best

The Henninger High School boys basketball team found another gear on Saturday. And it produced an almost easy-looking 59-48 takedown of No. 1 state-ranked Westhill before a jam-packed Allyn Hall Gymnasium.

Smothering defense, second-chance points and the indomitable play of senior point guard Romero Collier paved the way for Henninger's impressive win.

Collier had 16 points, 7 assists and 3 steals to lead the Class AA Black Knights, who are ranked No. 1 in syracuse .com's weekly media poll of large schools. Shaitique Blatche scored 17, Destin Blunt 11 and Keisean Scott 10.

"When the lights are on, we all step up to the challenge,' Collier said. "We scheduled this game because we want to play the best. We took this game to show everybody else we're the best team in town.' Westhill's Jordan Roland

led all scorers with 31 points. Henninger's Terrance Walker held Westhill's other big gun, Tyler Reynolds (16.8 ppg), to only four points.

"No excuses, they took it to us," said coach Kevin King.
"We might have taken

it to another level today," said Henninger coach Erik Saroney. "Bright lights help. Seniors, they thrive on this.

The Warriors are the state's top-ranked Class B team and are the defending state champions. They are No. 1 in syracuse.com's media poll of small schools.

Henninger was up to the challenge.

At one point, the Black Knights led by 20 points (48-28). The brilliance of Roland in the fourth cut that deficit in half (51-41) with 5 minutes to go. But Collier broke the momentum with a basket.

Terrance Walker of Henninger finished with 2 points. But his luminance came on defense by taking Westhill's Reynolds out of the game. Walker smothered and frustrated Reynolds, making for a miserable afternoon for the 6-foot-5 All-CNY forward.

"Terrance (Walker) guards the other team's best player every single night," Saroney said. "He has been a rock for us. We are not anywhere as good as we are without his defensive effort. What he did against Reynolds was huge."

helmets. It's a Detroit Red Wings logo because that was Griffin's favorite team. The logo is fitted with a letter 'G' for Griffin. Friday night, the Lakers

took it a step further when they hosted Cortland-Homer at Allyn Ice Arena in Skaneateles. They have been raising money for Griffin's Guardians, the foundation started by Erin and her husband, Adam Engle, to fight pediatric cancer and help families who are dealing with the diseases.

The Lakers set a goal of raising \$4,000. They wore special Gold for Griffin hockey jerseys because gold is associated with pediatric cancer. Their jerseys had Griffin's name on the back along with special logos. Cortland-Homer players wore special red jerseys honoring Griffin as well.

Erin and Adam were part of a ceremonial puck drop. Part of the gate receipts, proceeds from a 50-50 raffle and the money raised by the Lakers will go to the foundation.

Major, the longtime coach of the Lakers, has sweetened the pot for his players. If they reached their financial goal, he's promised to dust off his "Lakers in the Lake" celebration, which involves jumping in Skaneateles Lake. It was an idea Major said he started after losing a close friend and former Skaneateles hockey teammate, Todd Pittman, who perished in the terrorists attacks in New York City on Sept. 11, 2001.

Out of that personal loss grew Todd's Fund, which Major said has given almost \$1 million to help children in Central New York

Major said Todd's Fund made a \$1,000 donation to Griffin's Guardians and the team donated about \$5,000 to

Griffin's Guardians. He said he's prepared to jump into Skaneateles Lake – when the ice permits.

Major's wife, Kristin, and Erin, are longtime friends. They grew up together in Marcellus. They were in each other's weddings.

The loss of Griffin has been felt throughout the community.

'There are no words to describe it," said the Lakers coach. "It's tough. You feel for Erin and Adam. When you lose a 7-year-old ... he was such a happy-go-lucky kid, too. He loved life, and that's the tough part of the whole

thing.' Said Engle, "We're humbled. My husband and I are both humbled. For us to start Griffin's Guardians and have someone like Mitch and the hockey team embrace it, it's humbling. It's beautiful.

"It was a wonderful beginning for Griffin's Guardians and to raising awareness for pediatric cancer. People were so generous with their donations. We had a little boy ask if he could donate money, and then pulled the change from his pocket!"
